To qualify for the position, applicants must:

- Be 18 years or older
- Have a valid MN drivers license
- Pass an oral interview
- Pass a complete background investigation
- After acceptance, Reserves must successfully complete the Hennepin County Reserve Course

# Sprinkling Ordinance

Both Minnetrista and St. Bonifacius have sprinkling ordinances in place that restrict the days and times that sprinkling is allowed. The following are summaries for both cities:

#### Minnetrista

- Sprinkling is not allowed between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on any day of the week between May 1st through September 30th.
- This applies to new sod and seed as well as established lawns, vegetation,

shrubs, trees and gardens, unless a sprinkling permit (30 day grace) is obtained from the police department (for new sod or seed, new trees or shrubbery).

Odd/Even rules apply, meaning if the property address ends in an even number, irrigation may take place on an even numbered day of the week. If the address ends in an odd number, irrigation may take place on an odd numbered day of the week.

#### St. Bonifacius

- Sprinkling is not allowed between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on any day of the week.
- Odd/Even rules apply
- A 30 day grace for new seed or sod from the date of planting can be obtained by written request to the St. Bonifacius City Hall.

# Distracted Driving

You see it, and it's so aggravating. That vehicle ahead of you, slowly drifting in and out of the lane and onto the shoulder. You notice the driver holding their phone, actively engaged in conversation, or they're looking down, glancing up occasionally to check the road.

Tragically, distracted driving is more than just an annoying behavior. It's killing and seriously injuring people across Minnesota and leaving devastated families behind. The stories are heartbreaking.

- In June 2014, a driver picked up his cell phone to make a bank transaction while driving in Rock County. His distracted choice led to the crash that killed Andrea Boeve, a mother of two who was bicycling with her young daughters.
- Joe Tikalsky of New Prague was getting the newspaper from his mailbox across the road when a distracted driver killed him in October 2015.
- Chad Popp, a farmer from Rice, was hit head-on by a distracted driver using a cell phone in May 2016. The crash broke 36 bones in his body.

If you're tempted by distractions while driving, whether it's your phone, the radio, the coffee in your hand or simply daydreaming about the weekend – stop. Think about Andrea, Joe and Chad and what distracted driving did to them and their families. Think about your mom, sister, dad, son or best friend.

What would happen to your world if you lost them because someone simply wasn't paying attention while driving?

In Minnesota, distracted driving contributed to nearly 30,000 crashes and an average of 29 deaths and 146 life-changing injuries a year from 2019-2023 (preliminary figures).

Enforcement and awareness efforts can help promote safety, prevent tragedy and change dangerous behaviors. Officers, Deputies and Troopers across the state are putting in extra hours, looking for distracted drivers. We coordinate the campaign with funding from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. It includes advertising in support of the Toward Zero Deaths traffic safety program.

The hands-free cell phone law, already in place across all of Minnesota, means drivers can't hold their phone in their hand. Accessing or posting on social media, streaming videos, or Googling information while driving are against the law, even in hands-free mode. You can make calls, text, listen to music or podcasts and get directions, but only by voice commands or single-touch activation without holding the phone.

Make the safe choice to minimize distractions before you begin driving:

 Cell phones — Park the phone by putting it down. Activate the "Do Not Disturb" feature, si-

- lence notifications, turn it off, place it out of reach or go handsfree.
- Music and other controls Preprogram radio stations and arrange music in an easy-toaccess spot. Adjust mirrors and ventilation before traveling.
- Navigation Map out the destination and enter the GPS route in advance.
- Eating and drinking Avoid messy foods and secure drinks.
- Children Teach children the importance of good behavior in a vehicle and model proper driving behavior
- Passengers Speak up to stop drivers from distracted driving behavior and offer to help with anything that takes the driver's attention off the road.

By choosing to drive distraction-free, you can stay safe on the road and make sure everyone else on the road with you is safe, too. For more information, visit:

### May 1st Heatstroke Prevention Day

NHTSA Urges Families & Caregivers:

#### Once You Park, Stop, Look, Lock

Vehicular heatstroke is one of the leading causes of non-crash, vehiclerelated death for children 14 and younger in the United States. Parents and caregivers who think child heatstroke deaths could "never" happen on their watch should think again. Tragically, "never" does happen. The U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) urges parents and caregivers to learn about and share critical information about the dangers of leaving children alone in hot cars. Help us spread the word: Once You Park, Stop, Look, Lock.

Since 1998, when safety advocates first began tracking, vehicular heatstroke has killed more than 965 children

Each death was preventable. More than half (52.6%) of these tragedies occur when a child is "forgotten" by a parent or caregiver and left in a hot car. A busy parent or caregiver may

unintentionally forget that a quiet or sleeping child is in the back of the vehicle.

More than half (58%) of these heatstroke deaths occur at a home. Nearly one-third of these tragedies occur with children under one year of age. Why are hot cars so unsafe? For starters, internal vehicle temperatures can raise quickly and become up to 50 degrees warmer than the outside air temperatures. So even if it's a cool day outside, a vehicle may still pose a threat to a child. A child's body temperature increases 3 to 5 times faster than an adult's.

In 2023, 29 children died due to vehicular heatstroke, a decrease from the 33 children who died in 2022. The death rate has been lower in recent years. On average, 37 children die each year as a result of vehicular heatstroke.

Toddlers and young children are also at risk of vehicular heatstroke, and they are more likely to climb into a vehicle without supervision. Children "gaining access" to a vehicle accounts for nearly one-quarter of child heat-stroke fatalities. Some children climb into a vehicle without the knowledge of an adult and may be unable to exit the car, especially if child locks are activated

The bottom line and message to mothers, fathers, and caregivers — anyone is susceptible to forgetfulness. It doesn't matter who you are, what you do, or where you come from: In a fast-paced society, routines are often upended at a moment's notice. It is during these moments of hurriedness and change in routine that many of these preventable tragedies occur. For this reason, it is more important than ever to remember: Once You Park, Stop, Look. Lock.
